

Wyoming Marriage Law Guide

Much of the information below is state law; however, this information can change from county to county. We recommend contacting your County Clerk's Office before applying for your marriage license.

Officiants: Every licensed or ordained minister of the gospel may perform marriages. Ministers must provide a marriage certificate to the bride and groom upon request, and must return a certificate to the county clerk. Officiants are not required to register with the state, but must be legally ordained by a church and must present their credentials on request.

MARRIAGE LICENSE INFORMATION

ID Requirement: Valid driver license, and have a certified copy of your birth certificate. Know your parents' full names, birth places, and mother's maiden name.

Residency Requirement: Do not have to be a resident of Wyoming.

If Previously Married: If either applicant has been married before, you may be required to bring Proof of Dissolution.

Application Requirement: Both the bride and groom must appear in person at the time of applying. You can obtain a license at any County Clerk's office. You must bring a witness *who knows both of you* at the time you apply.



Waiting Period: There is no waiting period.

Fees: \$25. Be prepared to pay in cash.

Blood Tests: No blood test requirement.

Under 18: Applicants must be at least 18 years old, **or** must obtain written parental consent. Applicants under 16 years of age are permitted to marry only with a court order.

Proxy Marriages: Not permitted.

Cousin Marriages: Not permitted.

Common Law Marriages: Not permitted.

Same-Gender Marriages: Permitted.

Valid: A Wyoming marriage license is valid indefinitely, and does not expire. The license can only be used (solemnized) within the State of Wyoming.
